GRAMMAR

In English, there are two ways of conveying what someone else has said: direct/quoted speech and indirect/reported speech.

When using direct speech, we are quoting exactly what someone has said.

e.g. She asked "What time will you be home?" He replied "I will be home at 12."

When using <u>indirect speech</u>, we are reporting or summarising what someone has said. We do not use quotation marks for indirect speech. We may use the word 'that' before the reported words. Another thing to note is that the modal verbs from direct speech (e.g. will, can, must, shall, may) also change, taking their past tense forms (would, could, had to, should, might) in indirect speech. We may also need to change the personal pronoun, such as I, you, he, she, we, they, etc. e.g. *She asked what time he would be home, and he replied that he would be home at 12.*
